A Message from your Minister

Dear Friends,

I trust you all had a good summer and possibly were able to visit places near and far. I was also able to go on holiday and went to South Africa. I had a good break visiting family.

So it is that together we achieve another landmark in my ministry with you. It is one year today since I came to Emmanuel Sidcup as your minister.

Like most Churches, the ordinary life at Emmanuel follows a rhythm of worship that is at the centre of what Church is all about. Worship enables us to give glory and praise to God. Through the Holy Spirit, we are transformed and inspired to live holy lives. There are also many other ways we are engaged as a Church. There are a number of groups, clubs and organisations which are very important, a necessary support for the well being of the community. I believe as I look back at the year that we have been faithful in our witness to God who is Holy and True.

During this past year, it has been a time of exploration through listening, and asking questions to gain a better understanding of context, the community and how the Church at Emmanuel is fulfilling its Mission.

The big questions have been, “What does it mean to be Church in the postmodernity era?” and “Is the Church at Sidcup meeting the goals of the Mission Statement?”

I have observed that, there are challenges the Church needs to address, contextual realities of the communities it serves. The membership and attendance numbers are falling due to social mobility and natural selection. The Church needs to be concerned with this decline. This may be a sign of the times, but I have observed during special Services such a Christmas, the Church is full with the missing gap 25-40 years. So the question arises as to how can we as a Church attract and make a greater connection with these people so they participate in the worship of the Church more regularly.

The questions are difficult, however we have to seriously consider the way forward into the future. Church life is not about standing still or maintaining the status quo. It is about evolution, transformation and growth both at individual and community level.

The Church is the Good Shepherd who made a great effort to find the lost sheep (Luke 15:4-7). The Church has to be bold and outward looking so as to engage and attract young people. In this past year we have had one baptism and we have started Messy Church. I am praying that it will grow and flourish, for it is here for everyone. I would like to acknowledge and thank the Parents & Toddlers club leadership team and the church members who worked hard and put great effort into making our first Messy Church happen on the 13th of July 2013. The event was well attended. It is the grace of God at the heart of this work.

We need to be encouraged by the words of Dr. Daleep Mukarji, Vice President of the Conference, who said, *God is at the heart of Mission. Mission is one, Mission is*

God's not yours and mine. Let us listen to others, learn from others be prepared to be changed ourselves...Mission is about standing next to each other..

I am looking forward and praying that we are going to be fruitful and productive in the New Methodist/URC Year. I believe we are strategically situated and capable of fulfilling our mission as we wait on the Lord and the Holy Spirit to guide us along with those to whom he has given the call of the Great Commission.

I wish you every blessing for another New Methodist/URC Year, when it dawns next month.

Methodist Church - Home Missions

Now known as Mission in Britain

Mission in Britain means bringing shelter and hope to the homeless; support and love to families under pressure; fun and laughter to children in poverty. All this is done with a light touch. We act in the way that Jesus would act – through demonstrating God’s love for all his people, regardless of who they are.

The story below is just one of many.

The Mission in Britain Fund has given a grant of £27,426 towards employing a family cohesion worker for the Rosehill Methodist Community Primary School.



With 245 boys and 176 girls, Rosehill is larger than the average school. Many of its pupils are in single parent families and do not have consistent male role models in their lives. The family cohesion project was developed to strengthen and sustain cohesion between the school and the families whose children go there. The family cohesion worker’s job is to tackle bad attendance and behavioural problems.

The Methodist chaplain attached to the Rosehill School is heavily involved in providing pastoral care to the children and their families. This has resulted in the development of a relationship between the circuit and the school, supporting the work of the project in areas of parenting courses, providing basic welfare support to the families in their time of need and providing volunteers from the church when appropriate for larger community focused events.

One year on from the implementation of the programme, reports have shown a marked improvement in the behaviour of boys in the school. Signs of improvement have been seen especially around the area of social interaction. Teachers are now able to spend more time on teaching and less time on settling disputes between the children. The family cohesion project’s parenting courses have also made an impact on family life at home.

One of the mothers signed up in May 2012 for a Positive Parenting Course. Since then, she has shown more confidence in her general appearance and in her life in general. She attends Parent Forum meetings on a regular basis, and is now planning to go back to college to complete a course she interrupted when she became a mother. “This course has been a good help for me,” she said.



New Methodist President:

“We have to learn to expect to see God in the mundane”

The Methodist Conference opened in London today with the inauguration of the Revd Ruth Gee as President. In her inaugural address to the Conference, the Revd Ruth Gee spoke of a Church waiting expectantly for glimpses of God's glory.

"Waiting expectantly to glimpse the glory of God means waiting expectantly wherever we are and whatever the circumstances," she said at Methodist Central Hall. "This recognition of the presence of God is at the heart of mission and of evangelism which are surely about enabling people to recognise God already present with them, about introducing them to Jesus, about being the hands and feet of Christ in the world."

But she added that this recognition was a challenge. "At other times it is not so easy and we need to know God well to glimpse the glory. We have to learn to expect to see God in the ordinary, in the mundane, because that is the meaning of incarnation; that is the consequence of God's ceaseless movement into the depths."

The new president described Rublev's illustration of the Trinity - a fifteenth century Russian icon of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit - which features in the new booklet, *Glimpses of Glory*, launched by Methodist Publishing today. "Our belief in God as trinity means that we believe that God is dynamically relational," she said. "As you look at the icon, you are drawn into that space and into a dynamic relationship with God. God moves ceaselessly into the depths, reaching out to us in love and drawing us close."

At the end of her address, the Revd Ruth Gee emphasised that the calling of a Church to wait expectantly for glimpses of God's glory was no easy calling.

"Let me be clear," she pointed out, "recognising the presence of Christ does not deny the harsh reality of suffering and the existence of evil, of those things that are clearly contrary to the will of a loving God. This is the calling to stand alongside people in pain and suffering and to offer something of the love of Christ even there. This is the calling to recognise the presence of God in the mundane and the ordinary and to help others to find God there as well. Many Methodist people respond to this calling day by day in their communities and places of work."

Her address also emphasised the importance of ensuring that Church spaces are safe places for children and the vulnerable, and that the Church should challenge cruelty, indifference and violence as contrary to the will of God.

Love in a Box

Mustard Seed Relief Mission

Mustard Seed Relief Mission is an Eastbourne based Christian charity which provides much needed project work for disadvantaged children and sending humanitarian aid to the orphans of the Ukraine and Moldova.

In addition to routine aid which is sent and the project the charity supports, each Christmas since 1992 the charity has operated its much loved project 'Love in a Box'.

This project allows schools, businesses, churches and other organisations to fill shoe boxes with goodies for the children who would otherwise not receive a Christmas present.

Each shoe box is picked up, checked, sealed and sent to the children via lorry. The lorry is met by the English distribution team where the precious gifts are given out to the children who are eagerly awaiting them. Then the fun begins as the children open the gifts. There is always a shriek of laughter, joy and excitement. The children wait all year for this moment. The children always thank the distribution teams and ask us to say a big thank you to all the kind English people who show they care.

This part of the operation is, after more than a decade, one of the best known of our activities. We begin collecting the boxes at the end of October every year. We have sent on average 50,000 boxes each year and each one is individually received by a child.

Each box is sent to us with a 'love in a box' leaflet. A donation of £2.50 per box is requested and this goes towards some of the transportation costs.

The list on the right is a suggestion for the contents of the boxes. The lid and base should be wrapped separately and secured with a rubber band. Boxes should be available in church at the Family Service on October 20th, and will be collected soon after.

Leaflets, with full details, will be available in church soon.
