## Message From the Minister

Dear friends,

The Bible is full of stories. The story of the birth of Jesus is one of the most popular. It gives rise to the favourite Christian festival for all nations of Christian heritage. The Bible starts with the story of creation: "In the beginning...". The New Testament echoes it: "In the beginning was the Word", Jesus Christ incarnate.

But there's more to the Bible than stories, even though that's the easiest part of its teaching to remember. The Bible contains many speeches, including all the speeches of the prophets. Some Old Testament commentators believe that the earliest fragments of the Bible are prophetic writings. One of these consists of a few passages from the prophet Amos, written in the 8th century BC. So, historically, the Bible does not begin with the story of God creating the world, but with an angry prophet denouncing the injustices of his people.

The prophet Amos denounces his contemporaries: "I know how terrible your sins are and how many crimes you have committed. You persecute good people, take bribes and prevent the poor from getting justice in the courts." (Amos 5:12)

The prophetic tradition of Israel is an essential part of the Bible. The Gospel of Mark begins by acknowledging the importance of this tradition by recounting the ministry of John the Baptist, a prophet in the line of Israel's prophets. The other Gospels mention ancient prophecies that foretold the coming of the Messiah: "The young woman is with child, and shall bear a son, and shall name him Immanuel." (Isaiah 7:14); "But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days." (Micah 5:2).

So Jesus comes to listen to the prophet John the Baptist and is baptised. Jesus himself became a prophet, even though we don't usually think of him in that way. He took up the words of the Old Testament prophets and made their struggle for social justice and against religious hypocrisy his own.

As we can see, the liturgical season of Christmas is full of prophetic words. This encourages us to appreciate this aspect of the Bible and this way of expressing faith. The Christian faith is imbued with prophecy. Therefore, it is also important for we Christians to be prophetic like Christ, that is, to be intellectually and emotionally sensitive to the injustices of our time and to denounce all forms of hypocrisy in our society.

I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a happy start to the New Year!

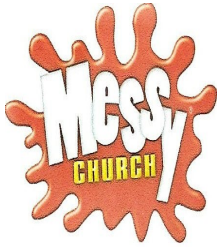

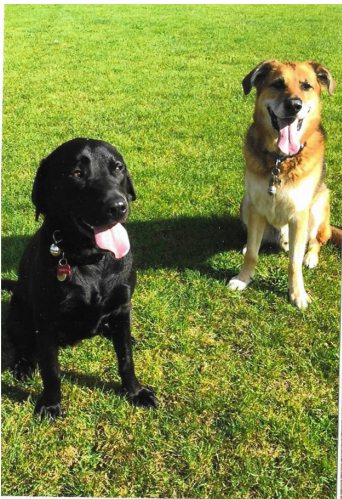

## Guide Dogs

Did any of you watch the programmes on Guide dog puppies ? I did as I have a special connection as my daughter went blind after having her second son.

Her life changed completely, she could no longer go out on her own. She had to get used to walking with a cane. Then she was introduced to Ed who was a German Shepherd cross Golden retriever. Once again her life changed this time in a positive way as he became her wonderful guide and friend. Taking her wherever she wanted independently. It was Ed who allowed her to train for blind cricket and subsequently be chosen for the England team that took part in the International Blind games in Birmingham in which they came 3<sup>rd</sup> and won a Bronze Medal and an England cap.

Guide dogs are retired between 10 - 11. Due to Covid ,when they had to stop the breeding programme as no puppy walkers were allowed, there is a shortage. So when they said Ed had to retire we were worried that she would be without help again. However someone was smiling down at her as she was introduced to a black Labrador called Hal. She has spent 2 weeks in a hotel in Maidstone training with him. He had spent a year with a puppy walker exposing him to as many experiences as possible, such as supermarkets, buses, trains etc. before going on to a further years Guide Dog Training. Here he learned to stop at kerbs, find the button at crossings avoid any obstacles and refuse to cross even when told to do so if a car was coming. The handler has to have such faith in their dog. Ed rewarded my daughter's faith when he flung her against a fence when a car mounted the pavement.

She couldn't bear to part with Ed after all those years so I looked after him while she did her training. I took him to Crayford and he insisted on walking me to the button in order to cross the road, yet he had never been there before!! Fortunately, Ed and Hal are now good friends enjoying each other's company but Hal has taken over as Alison's guide.

It costs £55,000 to train a Guide dog and you can always sponsor a puppy and get regular updates on their progress. Our family have named two in memory of my husband after Alison raised the money by a sponsored Sky dive and the longest zip wire among her fund raising.

Since writing this Martin Clunes has adopted a retired guide dog and has a programme about them on ITV.

Blind cricket has a bell in the ball. Totally blind players have a runner for them. Balls are bowled underarm and the batsman sweeps for it. Before a bowler bowls the backstop claps 3 times calling their name to give them the direction.

Dad enjoyed a brilliant social life and had the best friends you could wish for, and nothing was better than sharing happy times together and the best fireworks parties you could ever imagine.

Tom and I never wanted for anything. Dad helped us in every way, especially my English homework regularly on a Sunday afternoon - I hated English homework!

He supported both of us and enjoyed helping us with our studies, and I have him to thank for getting into art college and my current career. Dad loved being active in both our lives, from helping in the garden to DIY.

He also built the fastest go-cart in Sidcup. It's a shame we crashed and broke it so soon after it was made.

Colin was also a brilliant grandad to Hannah and Amelia. He loved reading the Beano to them on his regular Saturday visits; he enjoyed reading the Beano more than they did!

Thank you for being the best dad to me and Tom, the best husband to Mum, and the best grandad to Hannah and Amelia.

The Brown family, including Dad from above, says thank you to everyone for being here today and for your friendship and love.
